I will advocate for equitable allocation of DC budget resources and support programs that address housing stability, workforce development, and educational opportunity for Caribbean-American residents.

Washington, D.C. adopted the [Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act of 2022](#), which permits noncitizens who reside in D.C. for at least 30 days before the election and are at least 18 years old to vote for local offices and ballot initiatives. How will you support awareness and implementation of this law?

Yes. I support this law and will work with community organizations and DC agencies to ensure eligible residents are aware of and can exercise their right to vote in local elections.
