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1. If elected, how would you proactively and consistently engage with Caribbean-American constituents, groups, local leaders, and organizations in your constituency?

- I previously served as Executive Director of the Office of Community Relations. Between 2018-2025, it was my responsibility to ensure that every resident of the county had the opportunity to be heard, to be a part of community processes and defend their rights to participate in everyday life. In my current role as National Director of Programs for AARP Foundation, I continue that work by connecting our members aged 55+ to employment in their golden years.
- As Council Member, a priority of mine will be to achieve active presence and dialogue with all cultural affinity communities, inclusive of Caribbean-American groups and organizations, with a goal of improving community advocacy and equitable access to County resources. I will actively seek out the participation and advice of community leaders and individuals alike. Finally, I plan to ensure appropriate space for service on available boards and committees to ensure members of the community have a chance to directly affect policy enactment on the ground.



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2. How would your office address barriers Caribbean immigrants face when accessing public services such as healthcare, safe, affordable housing, education or social programs that disproportionately affect them?
  - Language access is treated as a right in Prince George's County because, as a multi-ethnic community, we recognize that often the first barrier to equitable access is the ability to understand what help is available. As a Council Member, I will request a performance audit of the implementation of Language Access across executive branch agencies. Second, as Council Member I will fully fund proactive translation efforts for all public documents and program literature to ensure language access is a proactive act of all agencies, including the creation of a centralized translated documents library, not a reactive practice.
  - Further, I maintain as twin pillars of my campaign, the protection of funding for the Health Assures program, which provides access to primary healthcare services for the uninsured through our federally qualified health centers; and, lowering the cost of rides to healthcare for our senior residents.
  - Finally, it is important to get a full understanding of needs directly from members of the Caribbean-American community, which is why I pledge to host community-specific events and information surveys that can be integrated into the Council's budget planning process.
3. How do you ensure culturally responsive services for Caribbean-American residents across agencies (e.g., health, education, law enforcement, etc.)?
  - As Council I will ensure that executive agencies consistently follow through with scheduled training to improve the delivery of culturally relevant services. This training must be planned, funded, and ultimately executed by the County Executive and their agency leaders. The Council will need to hold these agencies accountable both during the budget process and throughout the year through committee hearings and forcing the agencies to proactively engage with specific community groups. The information must be tailored to and adjusted to the appropriate audiences for that information to be absorbed and internalized. The Council's auditing functions will also be brought to bear onto agencies to ensure the proper implementation of culturally relevant service delivery processes and procedures.



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4. What initiatives will you lead and/or support that benefit Caribbean-American small business owners and workers, particularly in industries where they are heavily represented?
  - I am committed to expanding affordable job training and proactive employment services which takes opportunities to the resident rather than sit back and wait.
  - Supporting local business through access to capital and entrepreneurial mentorship programs have been proven to help create long-lasting opportunities for local business. I will also work to ensure County procurement provides assertive enforcement of local participation requirements on County funded projects to protect our local vendors.
  
5. What support would you provide for Caribbean-American students and parents, including language assistance and help navigating the school system?
  - The current PGCPSS parent engagement program is not living up to expectations of proactive adaptation to specific community needs. Programs and institutional knowledge are not being transferred to the community, as responsibility is diffused through multiple agencies such as the Memorial Library System and the Maryland State Department of Education.
  - As Council I would commit myself to the pursuit of reintroducing the Parental Academy model-- in which school teachers are offered payment for work with parents and families outside of regular school hours. Programs such as Side By Side, Inc. which operate in Laurel shows how such a model can be successful in attracting parents of diverse backgrounds to provide guidance on school processes and procedures, resource guidance and understanding of the classroom curriculum and academic expectations in a culturally competent and relevant manor. Such a program should offer translation services or services in the native language of the family.
  
6. How would you advance partnerships with Caribbean-American community organizations to promote mental health, chronic disease prevention, or other wellness initiatives?



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- Mandating a representative of the community participate in the Prince George's Health Action Coalition, a select community advisory group representing populations and agencies across the county to review the information collected to create the periodic Community Health Assessment. The affinity membership should be expert voices of the community able to advocate at the front-end of health policy and infrastructure planning in Prince George's County.
7. How will you build trust and conduct robust oversight on local, law enforcement to protect the rights, security, and safety of Caribbean-American residents?
- As Council Member it will be critical to effectively engage law enforcement to properly advocate for the specialized needs of the Caribbean-American community. Again, language access and respect for the resident is imperative in building productive rapport across audiences. Synching community interests across the police department and State's attorney's offices are key to tailoring services and agency activities to address the priority concerns and build the evidence needed to pursue successful enforcement.
  - Creating a link between the Office of Human Rights, which is responsible for enforcing language access requirements, and our law enforcement agencies will help. Requiring the participation of OHR in law enforcement conversations and planning by the chief of police is needed. At minimum, the Council should mandate the participation of the Office of Human Rights in standing Joint Agency Groups.
  - Mandate police cultural competency training contingent on approvals.
  - Include culturally representative membership on the Police Accountability Board
8. What programs, funding opportunities, or policy efforts will you champion that are aimed at improving outcomes for Caribbean-American communities?
- Our elders are critical caregivers in multi-generational households in our communities. Ensuring that these elders, some who may not have worked long enough in the nation to qualify for Medicare or Medicaid, have ready access to healthcare to remain healthy in a multi-generational household can be critical in avoiding financial burdens which may at time become ruinous. Reducing the cost to rides to medical



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appointments through MetroAccess and ensuring funding for Prince George's County Health Assures will have direct impact on the ability for all uninsured members of the community to have access to primary care appointments on their own times.
