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1. If elected, how would you proactively and consistently engage with Caribbean-American constituents, groups, local leaders, and organizations in your constituency?

If elected, I would prioritize consistent, relationship-based engagement with Caribbean-American communities by meeting people where they already gather and organize. That includes regular listening sessions with community organizations, faith institutions, and small business owners, as well as attending cultural events and supporting spaces that are already central to the community.

I would also establish a community advisory group that includes Caribbean-American leaders to ensure that concerns are not only heard but reflected in policy decisions. My approach is not episodic engagement, but ongoing dialogue that informs how I vote, allocate resources, and advocate across agencies.

2. How would your office address barriers Caribbean immigrants face when accessing public services such as healthcare, safe, affordable housing, education or social programs that disproportionately affect them?

Caribbean immigrants, like many communities, often face barriers that are not always visible in policy design but show up in practice, including documentation challenges, lack of clarity in navigating systems, and inconsistent access to services. I would focus on simplifying access to public services by supporting clearer intake processes, expanding language access



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where needed, and ensuring that agencies are accountable for equitable service delivery. I would also prioritize housing stability as a core issue, recognizing its direct connection to health, education, and economic opportunity. My goal is to reduce friction in the system so that residents can access what they are already eligible for without unnecessary barriers.

3. How do you ensure culturally responsive services for Caribbean-American residents across agencies (e.g., health, education, law enforcement, etc.)?

Culturally responsive services require understanding how people experience systems and ensuring that agencies are trained to respond appropriately. I would support regular cultural competency training across agencies and push for accountability measures that track whether services are reaching communities effectively. I would also advocate for hiring practices that reflect the diversity of the county and for stronger partnerships with community-based organizations that already have trust within Caribbean-American communities.

4. What initiatives will you lead and/or support that benefit Caribbean-American small business owners and workers, particularly in industries where they are heavily represented?

Caribbean-American small businesses are an important part of the county's economic and cultural landscape, particularly in food service, retail, and personal services. I would focus on improving access to capital, simplifying permitting processes, and making commercial space more accessible and affordable. I also believe the county should be more intentional about supporting small businesses through technical assistance, procurement opportunities, and targeted outreach so that businesses are not excluded from opportunities due to lack of information or access.

5. What support would you provide for Caribbean-American students and parents, including language assistance and help navigating the school system?

I would support stronger language access where needed, clearer communication from schools, and expanded opportunities for parent engagement that are accessible and culturally responsive. I also believe schools should work more closely with community organizations to ensure families understand available resources and feel comfortable advocating for their children.



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6. How would you advance partnerships with Caribbean-American community organizations to promote mental health, chronic disease prevention, or other wellness initiatives?

Mental health and wellness are deeply connected to stability, community, and access to resources. I would work to strengthen partnerships with Caribbean-American organizations to expand culturally relevant mental health programming and reduce stigma around seeking support. This includes supporting community-based initiatives that address both mental health and the underlying factors that impact it, such as housing instability, financial stress, and social isolation. Investing in prevention and community-based care leads to better long-term outcomes.

7. How will you build trust and conduct robust oversight on local, law enforcement to protect the rights, security, and safety of Caribbean-American residents?

I would support strong oversight mechanisms, including data transparency and independent review processes, while also creating opportunities for meaningful engagement between law enforcement and the communities they serve. My approach is to ensure that residents feel both safe and respected, and that their rights are consistently protected.

8. What programs, funding opportunities, or policy efforts will you champion that are aimed at improving outcomes for Caribbean-American communities?

I would prioritize policies that improve access to housing, economic opportunity, and public services, recognizing that these are interconnected. This includes expanding support for small businesses, investing in housing stability to prevent displacement, and ensuring that funding decisions are evaluated based on whether they are improving outcomes for communities. I would also advocate for partnerships with community organizations to ensure that programs are designed and implemented in ways that reflect the needs of Caribbean-American residents.
