1. If elected, how would you proactively and consistently engage with Caribbean-American constituents, groups, local leaders, and organizations in your constituency?

Jeana Jacobs: To ensure engagement of the Caribbean-American community in meaningful ways, I would meet with various constituencies including church leaders, youth, business owners, civic associations, not just during elections, but throughout the year. I would certainly ensure the voices are heard when issues have direct impact.

2. How would your office address barriers Caribbean immigrants face when accessing public services such as healthcare, safe, affordable housing, education or social programs that disproportionately affect them?

Jeana Jacobs: It is important to address potential language barriers that contribute to lack of information or access to services. I will support initiatives that are designed to build relationships/partnerships. I will work to ensure access to social services and programs that are essential for positive quality of life.

3. How do you ensure culturally responsive services for Caribbean-American residents across agencies (e.g., health, education, law enforcement, etc.)?

Jeana Jacobs: It will be important to engage directly with the community; encourage/support training; include the community if community workgroups, committees, etc.

4. What initiatives will you lead and/or support that benefit Caribbean-American small business owners and workers, particularly in industries where they are heavily represented?

Jeana Jacobs: I would work to ensure education and technical assistance where necessary for business owners/workers; I would also seek to identify incentives that support progress in the Caribbean-American community.

5. What support would you provide for Caribbean-American students and parents, including language assistance and help navigating the school system?

Jeana Jacobs: As a former school board member and now national advocate working with school boards in their role to support children, I would strongly advocate for services to ensure children have access to educational programs including language services and community services that support student/family success.

6. How would you advance partnerships with Caribbean-American community organizations to promote mental health, chronic disease prevention, or other wellness initiatives?

Jeana Jacobs: I would connect with faith-based communities to help support individuals/families; training may also be necessary to address stigma often associated with mental health services. I would encourage/require agencies to meet with members of the community to listen to concerns and provide resources of services available to them

7. How will you build trust and conduct robust oversight on local, law enforcement to protect the rights, security, and safety of Caribbean-American residents?

Jeana Jacobs: building trust requires true engagement with the community, understanding cultural distinctions, and hold agencies, including law enforcement accountable for protecting our constituency. This includes law enforcement meeting with community groups on regular basis to hear from you and address concerns

Jeana Jacobs: I would support community grants, promote initiatives designed to promote health equity, and partner with businesses, civic groups and others to support positive experiences in health care, language, education, public safety, and business growth.
